- Institutional coherence in delivering durable, long-term global environmental outcomes.






Global Ocean Governance & Resolutions Directing UN Agencies to support Member States implementation

- UNCLOS Part XII and Article 197
- SDG 14 Life below water
- UN General Assembly resolutions:
 - BBNJ Agreement adopted under UNCLOS on June 19, 2023
 - UNGA Resolution 76/212 on Integrated Coastal Zone Mngt
 - UNGA Resolution 77/248 on Oceans and Law of the Seas
 - UNGA Resolution 69/15 on SIDS Accelerated Modalities of Action [SAMOA] Pathway
- UNEA resolutions
 - Plastics and micro plastics
 - Pollution, land-based sources and activities, nutrients, wastewater
 - Nature based solutions
 - Mangroves, coral reefs, peatlands
- Regional Seas Conventions & Action Plans



UNEP Regional Seas Programme

- UNEP was established in 1972 and soon after, the Regional Seas Programme was launched in 1974
- The Regional Seas Programme now covers 18 regions globally, with over 146 participating countries.
- The 14 were established by or under the auspices of UNEP: Black Sea, Wider Caribbean, East Asian Seas, Eastern Africa, South Asian Seas, Caspian Sea, ROPME Sea Area; Mediterranean, North-East Pacific, North-West Pacific, Red Sea and Gulf of Aden, South-East Pacific, Pacific and Western Africa.
- 4 are independent partner programmes forming part of the UNEP global regional seas programme: Arctic region, Antarctic region, Baltic Sea, and North-East Atlantic region.





Regional Seas cooperation in ocean governance

- The Regional Seas Programme provides a platform for countries sharing a common sea/ocean to cooperate in an integrated manner
- The programme is an important mechanism for the implementation of the global Multilateral Environmental Agreements (MEAs)
- UNEP assists and guides coordination and facilitation of the development of the different instruments under the programme, in collaboration with other international and regional bodies
- UNEP's funding, intellectual, political, facilitative leadership and convening power was instrumental in the negotiation and development of the Regional Seas Conventions and Action Plans (RSCAPs)
- In some regions, the States/Parties took over the operation of the RSCAPs, while the operations of some other RSCAPs are still managed by UNEP





UNEP Regional Seas Programme Strategic Directions



- UNEP Regional Seas Programme Strategic
 Directions 2022-2025 aims to mainstream
 conservation, monitoring, and combating the triple
 planetary crises to achieve long-term health of the
 ocean
- Three strategic goals
 - 1. Secure diverse, resilient, and productive marine and coastal ecosystems
 - 2. Support assessment, information and knowledge management at all levels to strengthen science-policy dialogue
 - 3. Increase reach and mainstreaming of the Regional Seas Programme



Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework

Adopted in December 2022

The framework has four goals and 23 action-oriented global targets crafted to be applicable to all biomes ex. Target 1 – 4

Key Considerations

- Harmonized national monitoring, reporting and data collection
- Mechanism for regular exchange and mapping
- Elaborating and translating into regional specificities and supporting revision of strategic documents
- Supporting ratification and accession of existing biodiversity instruments





Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework

- Upscaling of successful pilots
- Identifying and making available pool of experts to support capacity building
- Technical guidance for headline indicators
- Identifying issues and priorities
- Reviewing dependencies and impact on ecosystems
- Reviewing existing policies and management frameworks
- Reviewing governance and management
- Stakeholder engagement activities
- Developing tools and guidelines for implementation

UNEP Regional Seas Programme is developing a strategy for Implementation in the regional seas





United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea (UNCLOS)

Biodiversity Beyond National Jurisdiction (BBNJ)



Legally binding instrument under UNCLOS on the conservation and sustainable use of marine biological diversity of areas beyond national jurisdiction

Adopted in June 2023

70+ nations have signed the historic treaty

Key Principles

- Conservation and sustainable use of BBNJ
- Marine genetic resources, including fair and equitable sharing of benefits
- Measures such as area-based management tools (AMBTs)
- Environmental impact assessments
- Capacity –building and the transfer of marine technology



Intergovernmental Negotiating Committee

To develop an international legally binding instrument on plastic pollution, including in the marine environment

Strategic Guide on Blue Economy for the Regional Seas Programme

- Launch in early 2024
- Steppingstone for Regional Seas Conventions and Action Plans
- Goal is to achieve coherence by all Conventions and Action Plans while equipping basic elements to adapt going forward
- A tool for implementing and demonstrating sustainable ocean-based economy, integrated coastal zone management, and marine spatial planning



Opportunities for SIDS in ocean governance



- 4th International Conference on Small Island
 Developing States 27 30 May 2024 in Antigua
 and Barbuda
 - Assess the progress, gaps, and challenges in the implementation of the Barbados Programme of Action, the Mauritius Strategy and the SAMOA Pathway, and the SIDS Partnership Framework
 - Renewed political commitment to address the gaps and the vulnerability of SIDS
 - Focus on practical and pragmatic actions for implementation



Opportunities for SIDS in ocean governance



- Leverage existing mechanisms for coordinated action and support in alignment with regional frameworks and national priorities
- Regional seas conventions and action plans provide a platform for dialogue and information exchange between countries, scientific communities, and civil societies to promote knowledge-sharing and cooperation, including through regional preparatory meetings, Intergovernmental Meetings, working groups on marine litter, etc.
